


EASTER DEVOTIONS

30 DAILY DEVOTIONS

AND LIFE GROUP DISCUSSION GUIDE





Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ. Ephesians 1:3

Our Theme this year, "**More than Able**," is taken from Ephesians 3:20, reflecting the spiritual blessings we've received in Christ (Ephesians 1:3) through His victory on the cross.

This 30-day devotional, curated by the Leadership team and church members, aims to encourage you as we approach Easter.

Remember, our God is more than able!

The booklet includes 4 Life Group Discussion notes for group sessions.

Consider doing the devotional together with your Life Group, sharing insights when you meet.

Additionally, commit to memorizing 1 or 2 verses weekly.

Start each day with prayer and reflection and journaling. The **ACTS** model can be a good prompt.

Adoration- Worship God for who He is.

Confession - Humbly confess any sin, seeking His mercy.

Thanksgiving- Thank God for His life-giving Word, and blessings.

Supplication - Ask God to help you apply today's lesson and guide your actions.

Finally, make a conscious effort to put into practice what the Lord reveals to you through His Word and your reflection on it.



When Abram was ninety-nine years old, the Lord appeared to him and said, "I am El-Shaddai—'God Almighty.' Serve me faithfully and live a blameless life. I will make a covenant with you, by which I will guarantee to give you countless descendants.

Genesis 17:1-2

Reflecting on these verses, I'm struck by how God steps into our lives, especially during tough times, to give us hope through personal encounters with Him.

Take Abram, for example. When we think about him being 99 years old, it's not just a number. It represents a long period of waiting and doubting, dealing with physical limitations, and the huge challenge of not being able to have children. But in that crucial moment, God shows Himself as El-Shaddai, the Almighty who always keeps His promises. He proves that He's enough and capable, going beyond our limits, situations, and flaws. When we see God fulfilling His promise to Abraham with the birth of Isaac, it reminds us of how faithful El-Shaddai truly is.

This revelation of God as El-Shaddai resonates deeply as we approach Easter. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ show us the ultimate example of God's power and sufficiency. For at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly (Romans 5:6).

This truth reminds us that what Jesus did on the Cross totally works. It's enough to wash away our sins, to make us new creations, and to restore broken relationships.

It shows us that no matter what we're going through, God's power is way bigger, bringing the redemption and healing we're longing for.

REFLECTION

Indeed, He is El-Shaddai - God Almighty! Hence there is nothing that's impossible for Him. Yet, He chooses us, just like Abraham. "Serve Me faithfully and live a blameless life!" In our weakness, we cannot fully fulfill this. But Jesus can and did it and paid the price for our redemption! So, clothed with Christ and filled with His Spirit, let us live out His call! Where will He lead me today?

And the LORD said to Abraham, "Why did Sarah laugh, saying, 'Shall I indeed bear a child, when I am so old?' Is anything too difficult for the LORD? At the appointed time I will return to you, at this time next year, and Sarah will have a son."

Genesis 18:13-14

Sarah had been listening to the conversation that Abraham was having with his visitors, one of whom was the Lord. She was 90, Abraham was 99, way past the age of child bearing let alone running after a toddler, so I don't think any of us would have had a different response.

But this wasn't the first time God had made this promise. In Genesis 17:15-16 God also said to Abraham, "As for Sarai your wife, I will bless her and will surely give you a son by her. I will bless her so that she will be the mother of nations; kings of peoples will come from her."

So if we were in this position and we were challenged by the question, 'Is anything too hard for the Lord?', of course we would say, 'No! But I can't see how you will do it in and through me... that is, from my current vantage point of age, financial position, health, let alone faith... I just can't see it'.

But the Lord sees on a different plain, outside the limits of time and people. He saw clearly that nations and kings would come from Sarah and ultimately Jesus the saviour of the world. And the Lord sees you and me in his master plan, beyond our circumstance and beyond our level of faith.

So I see no other way forward than to answer the Lord's question with, 'No, nothing is too hard for you Lord, but give me faith today to see what you see, even if I don't understand it and to be content in the knowledge that I am part of your beautiful plan'.

REFLECTION

Let us bow down and worship! Surrender to His perfect will! Indeed the scripture itself testifies "Now Abraham and Sarah were old, advanced in age; Sarah was past childbearing." (Genesis 18:11) Yet, "Is anything too difficult for the LORD?" Surely Not!, for He is the Creator, Lord of Heaven and Earth. Let us learn like Abraham and Sarah to walk by faith and not by sight!



The LORD said to Moses, "Is the LORD'S power limited? Now you shall see whether My word will come true for you or not."

Numbers 11:23

Numbers 11 recounts the frustration and anger of the people Moses led out of slavery in Egypt into the wilderness to meet with God on the way to the Promised Land.

Despite the Lord's provision of Manna during their journey in the wilderness, which "was like coriander seed, white, and its taste was like wafers with honey" (Exodus 16:31), the people seemed to forget His care, promises, and displays of power and love.

When faced with hardship, they not only forgot His past deeds but also doubted His identity.

Reflecting on this, do we underestimate the Lord's capabilities?

Have we forgotten His past interventions and promises for us?

Now is an opportune moment to recall God's faithfulness, His promises, and anticipate what He has in store for us.

Very challenging! The people asked for meat! "Life was better in Egypt!", they say. Moses, himself complains "The burden is too great!" God promises to give the people meat! Meat for a month!! For 600,000 families!! Even Moses can't believe it! BUT it's GOD who speaks and who will do it! He also eases Moses' burden by anointing 70 elders with the Spirit!! HE IS MORE THAN ABLE!

God is not a man, that He should lie, Has He said, and will He not do it? Nor a son of man, that He should repent; Or has He spoken, and will He not make it good?

Numbers 23:19

This verse is part of a discussion between two very interesting people. It is a word from God, given to Balaam, a prophet who did evil and was willing to sellout Israel, to tell Balak, a king who was wanting to destroy parts of Israel.

Balaam in his desire to get a reward for doing evil first consults God with the hopes of getting approval for the evil he wants to do. God responds with a declaration of His holy nature which is opposite to the nature that Balaam is displaying.

I see God declaring that he does not go back on his word, that he does not lie or cheat, God declaring that He is able to fulfill his promises, that He is always faithful. Basically, God is explaining that his holy nature is different from sinful human nature, and He can always be trusted.

I am encouraged in reading this to keep God as the first place I put my trust. If I put my trust anywhere other than in God, I know that eventually my trust will be broken in some way. No person or thing can stay true and faithful to every promise like God can. I cannot trust my health, my finances, my relationships, or any other thing I can list to never fail me. But I can trust God to always deliver on every promise He has made.

Wow! How assuring it is that God's promises to us are signed and sealed, and not up for negotiation by some hostile higher bidder! Balaam knew that God can not be corrupted, yet he was enticed by the rich treasures offered to try. Let us take courage, God does not change His mind! And He is for us, not against us! How can this make a difference to what you may be facing now?



This book of the law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in it; for then you will make your way prosperous, and then you will have success. Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous! Do not tremble or be dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go.

Joshua 1:8-9

When we are called to step into uncharted territory or the unknown, many a times we are instantly guided by our practical, worldly mind where fear and doubt takes over. But here I'm reminded to be like Joshua. To believe in advance what will only make sense in reverse – where God is calling Joshua to a high level of faith – where God's presence will be with him wherever He goes and the key to a prosperous way, is obeying the Living Word.

When we focus on God's Word, something supernatural is happening in the spiritual realm, the unseen. The clearing of our mind from worldly thoughts and desires to God's truth bringing release, restoration, strength, power and hope. When we hear and obey the Living Word, we are actually working with God to see change in us and others.

Joshua 1:9 is such an encouragement where God is reminding us that He is with us no matter what comes our way. For us to be strong (ie. able to withstand force, pressures of life), and be courageous (ie. not deterred by danger or pain and able to face fear without flinching), do not be afraid (ie. do not be worried or full of apprehension) and do not be discouraged (ie. lose confidence or enthusiasm or be disheartened).

These two verses are a beautiful reminder on how to live like Christ, holding all things loosely except Him, His words and His promises.

Now then, give me this hill country about which the LORD spoke on that day, for you heard on that day that Anakim were there, with great fortified cities; perhaps the LORD will be with me, and I will drive them out as the LORD has spoken.

Joshua 14:12

As a recovering perfectionist, I used to assess whether I wanted to start or do something based on whether I thought I'd be good at it. I didn't enjoy losing, failing, or feeling stupid. I wanted full control of whatever I was getting myself into and I wanted to be as sure as I could about whether or not I would succeed as though I had something to prove!

When Moses sent twelve scouts to explore the bountiful promised land the Lord had commanded, instead of delight, they immediately jumped to conclusions about many things: "the giants living there are stronger than we are", "we will die in battle", "our wives and little ones will be carried off as plunder..." Like me, the Israelites were too focused on what they were capable of in and of themselves, and as a result, failed to look to and obey the Lord.

Of the twelve scouts, only Caleb and Joshua looked beyond themselves and saw a greater God than any giants, obstacles or challenges that stood in their way. They knew that if the Lord was with them, they could overcome anything just as the Lord had said... Because it was never about them or what they could do as mere humans. Rather, it was always about what God willed. When He calls, when He speaks, and when He promises, He's always the one making it come to pass.

In what ways have I disobeyed God or limited myself by focusing on the wrong things?

REFLECTION

Caleb and Joshua listened to God and took Him at His Word. Then they stepped out in faith trusting in His promise. Who do I listen to? Compare Caleb and Joshua to their ten fellow spies. Looking at the outcome, who would you rather be? What changes do you need to make?



Behold, I have done according to your words. Behold, I have given you a wise and discerning heart, so that there has been no one like you before you, nor shall one like you arise after you. I have also given you what you have not asked, both riches and honour, so that there will not be any among the kings like you all your days.

1 Kings 3:12-13

The Lord came to Solomon in a dream saying, "Ask for whatever you want me to give you". Instantly Solomon thanked the Lord for how he had blessed his father David and asked for wisdom to govern his people well. God was pleased with this request and made the decision to not only give what he had asked but more.

This passage makes me see the Lord as a loving father to Solomon who is proud of his child. Proud that he had not asked for a selfish request such as long life, wealth or the death of his enemies but rather, wisdom to lead the Lord's people well. Because of this, God wants to give his child more. It reminds me that when we ask for things in line with what God desires, God is not only able to provide what we ask, but desires to give us more.

It encourages me because when I ask the Lord to grow me, to help me overcome any fears or anxieties, to learn to have more patience or love in my relationships and to become more like Christ, He will and more. And I can claim this in faith and believe wholeheartedly, for He is a loving father who longs for me to become the woman that He has called me to be.

REFLECTION

Solomon approached God in a humble way, seeking nothing for himself but only for the good of God's people. GOD IS OPPOSED TO THE PROUD, BUT GIVES GRACE TO THE HUMBLE. (1 Peter 5:5). How can you live this out today?



If My people who are called by My name humble themselves and pray and seek My face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, will forgive their sin and will heal their land.

2 Chronicles 7:14

The backdrop of this statement is about the covenant between God and the nation of Israel; and it connects to the temple that Solomon built and dedicated to the Lord. God tells Solomon that God will respond to the cries of His people in the place, the descendants of Abraham whom He has chosen, if they humbly confess and turn from their sins, and seek to please Him. God assures that He will give heed to His people's prayers and bring the blessings back to the land if these conditions are met.

Today we are not Israelites but we have the New Covenant made through Jesus - who does what Solomon could never do - obeying God perfectly, and Jesus Himself is the temple! This New Covenant is not about a nation but about people who have faith in God. "If my people ... will turn from their wicked ways" reveals to us that before the greater blessings of God, there has to be a turning on our part! It is not just about who we turn to , but also what we now choose to turn away from, ie repent of.

When we - God's people called by His name - turn to Him, humble ourselves, repent, and pray in the name of Jesus, He will bring us healings. This new covenant does not focus on material blessings but on the mission of bringing God's message to the world and for us to live as God intended: to glorify His name by reflecting Christ's life to the world.

May we, God's people through Jesus Christ, humble ourselves and seek only after God by turning away from sin, so that we can be His vessels in this world.

Amazing! What a privilege we have! Imagine trying to get an audience with the PM of a country. But here God assures us, His people, that His ears are attentive to our prayer, so long as we turn away from evil and seek His face! All because of Jesus' work on the cross! How can we thank Him today? Then Esther told them to reply to Mordecai, "Go, assemble all the Jews who are found in Susa, and fast for me; do not eat or drink for three days, night or day. I and my maidens also will fast in the same way. And thus I will going to the king, which is not according to the law; and if I perish, I perish."

Esther 4:15-16

Speaking up for what is right is not always easy. Especially when it may result in your death!

The Book of Esther is a beautiful story about a young heroine whose brave action saved her people from annihilation. Esther was a Jewish girl living in Persia who, by reason of her beauty, found herself with access to the King. King Xerxes' right hand man, Haman, became enraged at a Jew, Esther's uncle Mordecai, for refusing to bow before him. So much so, that he convinced Xerxes to issue a decree that all Jews be killed.

Mordecai heard of the decree and, through a messenger, appealed to Esther to step in and ask Xerxes for mercy. Even as Queen, Esther knew that for her to enter the King's presence uninvited was to risk death.

She asked her people to fast, while committing to do the same. "If I perish, I perish" is her declaration of faith in, and obedience to a Sovereign God. Esther put obedience to God before her own survival! Esther's approach to the King was successful and in the end Mordecai was honoured, while Haman was hanged.

Is there a situation in my family, school, work, or even in my church where I should speak up for what is right? Has God given me particular access to government? Can I use my influence to advocate for the good welfare of others? Will I step out and speak up believing that God is more than able?

LIFE GROUP DISCUSSION GUIDE

Just as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we would be holy and blameless before Him. In love.

Ephesians 1:4

- 1. These are humbling revelations that the Apostle Paul shares here
 - GOD chose us!
 - In Christ! (because of Jesus!)
 - Before the World was formed!

Share how these insights impact you.

2. God chooses us and therefore He issues a call on our lives, that is the same as God's call to Abraham; "to be holy and blameless before Him". We note that only God is intrinsically holy, and there is no holiness without a healthy relationship with God!

Share how you feel about this call on your life & your response.

- 3. Watch the Bible Project Video on "Covenants" (eg in the App or on YouTube)
- How does God see our relationship?
- What has He done for this?
- What is His expectation on us?
- 4. Consider Sarah's response in Genesis 18:13 (Day 2) and the outcome in Genesis 21:6.

Share why it can be difficult to trust God and why it is worth it.

5. Consider 2 Chronicles 7:14 (Day 8), "If My people who are called by My name humble themselves and pray and seek My face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, will forgive their sin and will heal their land."

Noting also that now is the season of Lent, let's put this promise into action! Spend some time in worship, confession and seeking the Lord's face!



MY PRAYER AND REFLECTION



I know that You can do all things, And that no purpose of Yours can be thwarted.

Job 42:2

God is a God of possibilities, nothing is impossible. God spoke and the world came into being. His power is displayed all around us. When sin entered the world, could His plan to be in relationship with Adam and Eve, be stopped? NO! He made a way through to ensure that we can be right with Him again. There is nothing that He can't do, to accomplish the plans and purpose He has.

REFLECTION

Wow! How can we thank our God enough? He is all powerful! He has a good purpose in mind for us! And none of His purposes can be thwarted! How marvelous! So let's move forward in that confidence and draw into his presence!



You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; You have anointed my head with oil; My cup overflows.

Psalm 23:5

King David writes prophetically of his experience of the Lord as His Shepherd. David was a shepherd himself from youth, and a good shepherd indeed, fighting the lion and the bear to redeem a young lamb. But David suffered intense persecution from king Saul who fiercely sought David's death, and several times David escaped death only just.

He knew the experience of the "valley of the shadow of death" first hand. But David also knew the Lord's provision, ie "a table prepared before him", in the midst of the persecution. And more than that he was intimately aware of the Lord's presence and His choosing ("anointing") of David! David was secure in the Lord His God! "He will dwell in the Lord's house forevermore."

All of scripture ultimately points to Jesus! The Psalms are divinely arranged as a divine prayer book that overall tells God's story and what it means as a believer to walk with God. Psalm 23 sits in a series of Psalms that foretell the coming of Messiah. Psalm 22 foretells the crucifixion and Psalm 24 introduces the Messiah as the coming king of Glory.

In Psalm 23 prophetically we see "the greater David", Jesus, living His life utterly depending on God and trusting in His goodness and deliverance even in the face of the "shadow of death"! Our God is more than able! Let us likewise fully entrust ourselves to the LORD and as His chosen people be assured of His Goodness even amidst trials.

REFLECTION

The "shadow of death" was real for David, repeatedly he was in grave danger. But he chose to look beyond the obvious to what God has provided nonetheless and what God will do for him. Where do I look in my daily troubles?



Delight yourself in the LORD; And He will give you the desires of your heart.

Psalm 37:4

Psalm 37 has been called the "Fret Not Sermon". See the guidelines it gives that show us how to avoid becoming fretful or irritated. Consider envy which is a bitter condemnation of another's success. Acknowledge our need to confidently trust in the Lord, as well as delight in the Lord. He promises to give you the desires and secret petitions of your heart. Confidently trust in Him today.

Sixty-three years ago, I approached the throne of Grace with a petition which seemed impossible to resolve. As verse 39 says . . . the consistently righteous is of the Lord; He is their refuge and secure stronghold in the time of trouble.

My husband and I fully trusted Jesus Christ to answer our petition for Ron's recovery from cancer but the answer was not what we desired. Ron was called 'home' and I was left with the deep pain of his death. What else could I do but accept God's answer? I learned to identify with the Christ of the Cross and His suffering. Thirty-two years later, I walk life's journey with the Bible as my guide and my eyes upon Jesus.

This Easter, find a bitter-sweet delight as you join the Saviour in the Garden, see the cruel cross, the open tomb.

He is not there. Jesus Christ is risen. Hallelujah!

REFLECTION

"Do not fret" counsels David in this Psalm. In all David's troubles, he would have had much to fret and complain about. But instead he chose to trust fully in God's promises and delight in Him. Is there a "David" in me?



But now, thus says the LORD, your Creator, O Jacob, And He who formed you, O Israel, "Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name; you are Mine!

Isaiah 43:1

I've loved this verse for a long time, but not because of God's promise to redeem me. I love this verse because it is proof that I have an inherent identity and value as a child of God.

For a large part of my life, I've struggled with pride. And the most invasive means by which pride crept into my life was in how I viewed myself. Any accomplishment or success became a testament to my own skill and hard work. Any failure or rejection became proof of what I dreaded most: that I could not be good enough. It was like I was walking through life with a nametag, and the nametag simply read my latest win or loss. That's how I saw myself.

However, this verse says that when God sees me, he doesn't think of my latest win or loss, he simply thinks "Mine". If I were to have a nametag in the spiritual realm, I reckon it might just read "God's".

This shatters pride. Because it means the thing that redeems me isn't my latest promotion, or how well my relationship is going, or how joyful I am in my serving, or by working hard to be a good person; it's because of who my father is. It comes by inheriting the love and protection of my God. My God that looks at me and says 'I see you. I know you. And I will fight for you because you are mine.'

REFLECTION

God knows my name! And He sees me and calls me out of the crowd. Isn't that amazing! How humbling! And for whatever I fear, He says "Fear Not! For I have redeemed you!" How can I let this sink in and shape my outlook today?



Behold, I am the LORD, the God of all flesh; is anything too difficult for Me?

Jeremiah 32:27

This verse in context is the word of God that came to Prophet Jeremiah, approximately 700BC, and says that the LORD is going to allow the kingdoms of the east to conquer Jerusalem and Israel and take them captive to Babylon. Jeremiah reminds the people of God about the warnings He has been sending through His Word all through their lives. However, people didn't listen. God has His own ways of bringing His people back to Him, and during those days He allowed Babylonians, Assyrians, and later Persians to rule over the people of Israel His chosen ones when they rebelled against Him and chose to worship idols.

This verse proclaims the Almighty, sovereign God who is creator of all things and is not dependent on any creation. Applying this in my life and to most of us, we could be rebellious sometimes, hard-hearted, or misunderstand God due to the challenges or situations we pass through in our lives. And we only realise later how He works it for our benefit. All through the Bible we see such characters like Moses, David, Jonah, Peter, and Paul. Their ordinary lives are similar to ours. It is only when they realise how God works in each one's life, that they choose to become completely dependent and surrender to do His Will.

As we read Scripture and learn to know God better and how He deals with people, we read how keen He was for each one of them. The Good news is, the God who created us, Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, through His indwelling Holy Spirit is eager to have a relationship with us, and working through our lives to fulfill His plan and purpose in each of our lives.

No matter how our circumstances are, He is the LORD, God of all mankind. Is anything too hard for Him? Let's build our trust and faith in the everlasting God who in His Son brought us everlasting life. Praise God!

REFLECTION

Jeremiah is faced with a seemingly senseless decision. But God challenges him, "I am God ... is anything too difficult for me?" God has a good plan in store, fully planned out. Whatever challenge I need to face today, will I choose to walk by sight, or by faith in God?



"Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in My house, and test Me now in this," says the LORD of hosts, "if I will not open for you the windows of heaven and pour out for you a blessing until it overflows."

Malachi 3:10

For context, the setting in the book of Malachi was about 100 years after Israel's return from exile in Babylon. They began to grow weary of God's promises. In particular the promise of the Messiah that would come and set up God's Kingdom over Israel bringing peace and justice. Just like their predecessors, their weariness causes them to fall into idolatry and unfaithfulness.

How does it apply to us? Just like them, we have a tendency to do the same. When I think about my life, I too have the tendency to bring my half hearted offerings to God. I say I want to fully trust God but when life gets a little rough, I turn to controlling things in my own way.

The verse says "Bring the full tithe" which reminds me of the boy brought who his five loaves and two fish to Jesus which He used to feed over 5000 people. What a great example of releasing what we have available to God and watching Him multiply the blessings many times more to even more people.

The ultimate example of God's eternal blessing is the life and sacrifice of Jesus. Jesus is the ultimate example of someone who brought His everything to the Father and through Jesus and His sacrifice, God's abundant redeeming grace is available to generations like you and I.

How are we able to "bring our full tithe"? By knowing that we have all we really need in Christ. We are able to give all we have because God has given all He has through Christ.

DAY16 17 MARCH

But the free gift is not like the transgression. For if by the transgression of the one the many died, much more did the grace of God and the gift by the grace of the one Man, Jesus Christ, abound to the many ... resulting in justification.

Romans 5:15-16

Recently, working as a teacher, I had an encounter with one of my students, that really made this verse come alive. She had been absent from class and needed to complete a report. During lunchtime I found her sitting by herself in a corner in the library.

Our encounter went like: "Hey, We missed you in class, you still need to finish your report. If you have time I can go through it with you." "Oh, uh... , I'm suspended..."

Turns out, she had received an internal suspension for an incident on an excursion. I listened to her share about her struggle. It was an awful mix of issues, that led her to consistently make poor decisions and get in trouble. She really wanted to change, but the vicious cycle made her feel trapped and robbed her of any sense of identity and joy .Heartbreakingly, at the end she said to me - "You're the first teacher who actually listened and understood me".

At that point, I just felt the Holy Spirit tell me to first push the science report aside, and just speak graciously to her, sharing with her about God's gracious gift of the cross that breaks the cycle, gives us forgiveness, makes us right with God, and allows us to take on a new identity as a child of God.

What she needed to break the cycle was the gracious gift of Jesus Christ. The cross remains the one, and only answer to sin in our lives. No amount of punishment, self-motivation or accountability can ever make us right with God. Not only do we receive for ourselves this grace through His blood, we are empowered to infect the lives of others with it. We find Christ in the fabric of our everyday lives and we die it red with his blood, full of God's gracious gift.

- 1. Think about this! God so much cares for us that in His kindness He makes good plans for us, He predestined us to the adoption as sons through Jesus!
- "Predestined"- can be comforting or "scary". What do you think, do we have a choice in this?
- How do we know that we are adopted as sons of God? (Romans 8:14-17)

- 2. From Numbers 23:19–23 we see that God is true to His Word! But only His Word! The prophet Balaam was enticed by offers of riches to prophesy against God's chosen, but He could not! Why is it important to know God's will and His Word?
- 3. Joshua (Joshua 1:8-9) was told to meditate on God's Word and then and only then would he succeed in entering and claiming the Promised Land. Why is it important to dwell in God's Word and let it be our guide?
- 4. The Scriptures are full of prophecies (several 100) about the Messiah that are fulfilled in Jesus (Luke 24:26-27).

 - Seeing how God carefully watched over His Word in order to fulfill it in regard to Jesus the Messiah, what confidence does this give you for trusting yourself unto God's promises.
- 5. Caleb took God at His Word! And entrusting himself to God he was able to take the hill country of Amalek, the "land of giants". Mordecai & Esther relied on God's covenant with Israel and (after fasting and stepping out in faith) successfully saw deliverance for the people of God.
- How can we learn from their faith and apply this to our own life?

LIFE GROUP DISCUSSION GUIDE

In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of His grace.

Ephesians 1:7

- 1. God declares Himself as Our Redeemer in Isaiah 42:1. In fact, God repeats this promise of future redemption over 20 times in Isaiah beyond chapter 40. After 39 chapters full of warnings and of judgments, comes the turning point in Isaiah 40 where God says "Comfort My People!" and starts to outline His future plan for a "New Hope" for God's people, written 700 years before Jesus. How does this encourage you that God's ultimate aim is always to "Redeem" us?
- 2. How does this encourage you that God promised and carefully planned our redemption (eg. Isaiah 9 predicts the virgin birth of the Messiah, and Isaiah 53 predicts the crucifixion of the Messiah and His resurrection) from ancient time? And then stood by His Word to carefully execute it?
- 3. God's good plan did not come without a price to be paid. But Jesus was willing to pay the price for our redemption.

Our redemption was bought

- through His blood
- according to the riches of his grace
- for the forgiveness of our trespasses (sin)

How do you feel about God's amazing redemption? Imagine someone just saved your life during an accident? What should be our response?

4. In Galatians 4:4 the apostle Paul puts it like this:

"But when the time arrived that was set by God the Father, God sent his Son, born among us of a woman, born under the conditions of the law so that he might redeem those of us who have been kidnapped by the law." Galations 4:4 MSG

- Note God's precision timing- "at the set time" He is never late!
- Effectively we were like someone kidnapped for ransom. We needed to satisfy the kidnapper and pay the ransom in order to live and be free. But the ransom required was way out of reach!

In the midst of whatever trial you are facing, how do these facts encourage you? How can you apply this to your situation?



MY PRAYER AND REFLECTION

Yet, with respect to the promise of God, he did not waver in unbelief but grew strong in faith, giving glory to God, and being fully assured that what God had promised, He was able also to perform.

Romans 4:20-21

It's interesting that Paul described Abraham as one who "did not waver".

Reading Genesis 12-25, wasn't Abraham the guy who, just to save his own life, lied about his relationship with his wife to 2 different kings (First to Pharaoh in Genesis 12:10-20, then to king Abimelech in Genesis 20:1-17)? Abraham also bent under his wife's influence to have a child through a female slave (Genesis 16:1-16), a decision which had negative implications on the family in many ways!

It looked like Abraham was "wavering" as he drifted through being fearful for his own life, the stressful expectation of producing an heir, on a background of other events like famine, family disputes and God's fiery destruction of sinful cities. Yes, Abraham fumbled with some questionable decisions and even laughed at God's promise of a son (Genesis 17:17).

But Abraham "didn't waver through unbelief! Rather we see many examples of Abraham taking obedient action after God spoke to him. We see Abraham repeatedly building altars and calling on the name of the Lord (Genesis 12:9, 13:4, 13:18). Through multiple conversations between God and Abraham across the latter's lifetime (Genesis 12:1–5, 13:14–18, 14:18–20, 15:1–21, 17:1–26, 18:1–15 and 16–33, 22:1–19), God consistently repeated and reaffirmed His promise to Abraham. Through every conversation and life event, God strengthened Abraham's faith. And Abraham's character development ultimately brought glory to God, the One who is faithful and unwavering even in the most impossible circumstance.

Nothing would prepare me though for the inability to communicate the simplest of things in another language. It was as if I had regressed to be a child again. It was pure and utter frustration to not be understood, to struggle to put words into a constructive sentence. How would it be possible to convey the message of the gospel?

I was very quickly humbled to realise that despite my competency, despite my qualifications, despite my experience that without God I was nothing.

So often in life we place our identity in ourselves, our qualifications, our status, our possessions, our positions. Yet it is in placing our everything in our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ that we become a useful instrument for His Glory.

It is in this humbling that God is able to use us to build His Kingdom. It is in this humbling that the impossible for man becomes possible for God.

2. What does it look like in 2024 to live a life that demonstrates I believe God is sovereign over all earthly powers, despite being surrounded by a society that doesn't share this belief? For example, do I move in with my boyfriend because our culture models this relationship norm, or do we entrust our relationship to God's authority and aim to remain obedient to Him?

Every day, I am still faced with many tiny decisions that call my motives and allegiance to God into question. I pray that I will use these small choices as a training ground for building trust with God to enable me to respond in faith to bigger challenges.
